# MRC editathon, 11 October, The Royal Society Feedback form – summary of responses

We received 17 feedback forms from 19 attendees at the MRC editathon.

Notes: the feedback has been given a numerical value to aid analysis, with the bottom of the scale (eg: "very bad") being given one and the top (eg: "very good") a value of five.

4. Tell us at least one thing that would have improved this workshop for you

Several people suggested that more time for editing would have been useful, and another group of comments indicated that it would be useful to ask participants to prepare beforehand. For one person, having to set up an account on the day delayed them from editing, and the training ran into the problem of registering too many people from the same IP address. It is often common practise to ask people to register before the day. If people have the opportunity to research a particular subject in advance, it is one less thing to worry about on the day.

Katie Chan's talk was specifically highlighted by one person as especially useful. A one-toone approach was thought to be more effective than demonstrations. On a housekeeping note, one person pointed out that round tables meant some trainees had their back to the presenters.
