

WikiConference UK 2013, Lincoln College

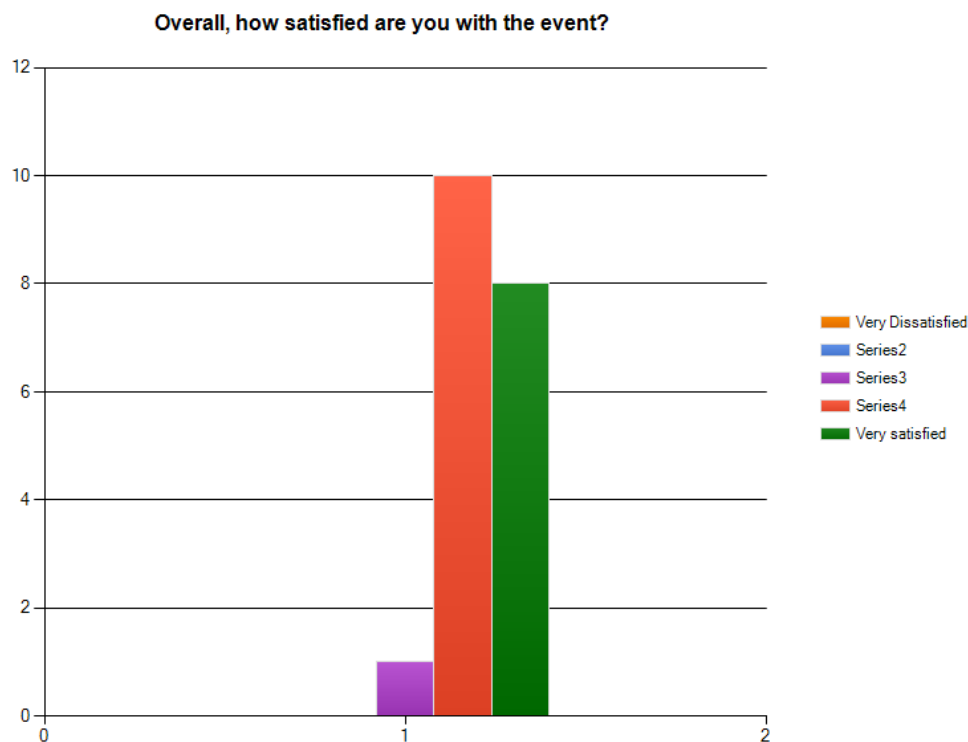
Feedback form – summary of responses

1. Overall, how satisfied are you with the event?

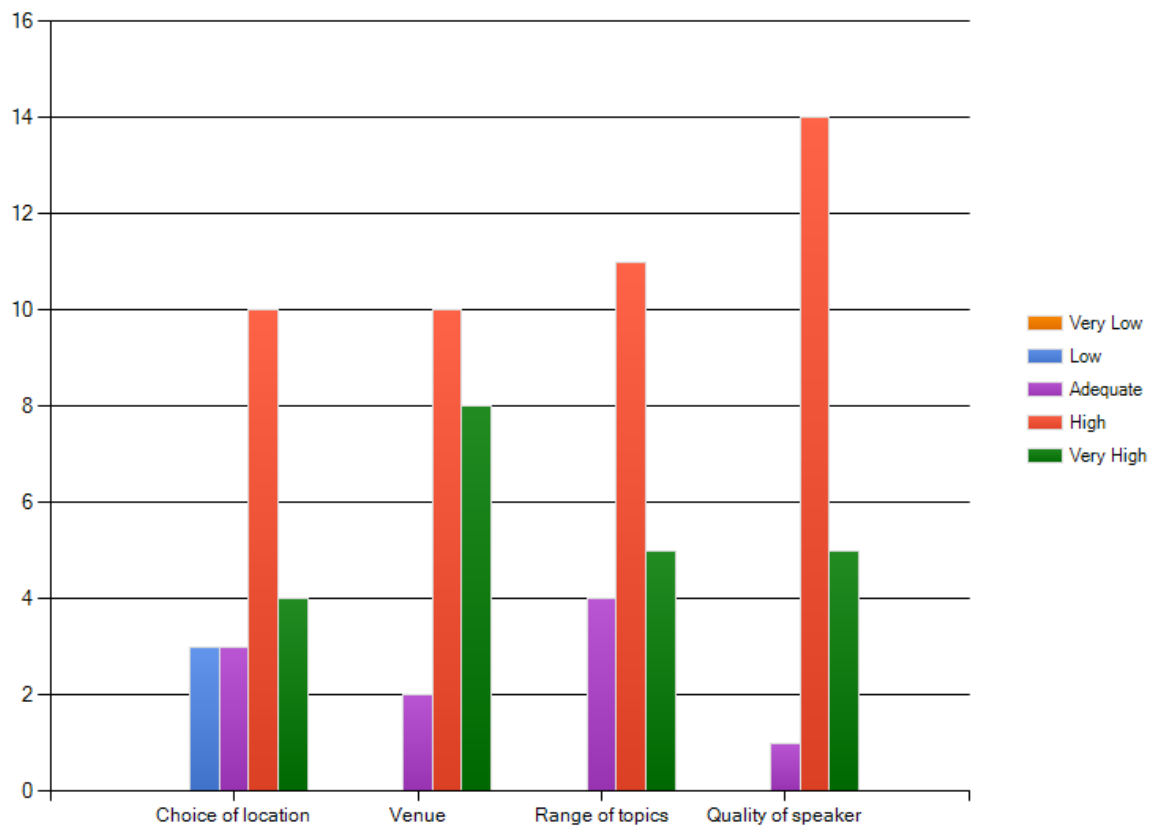

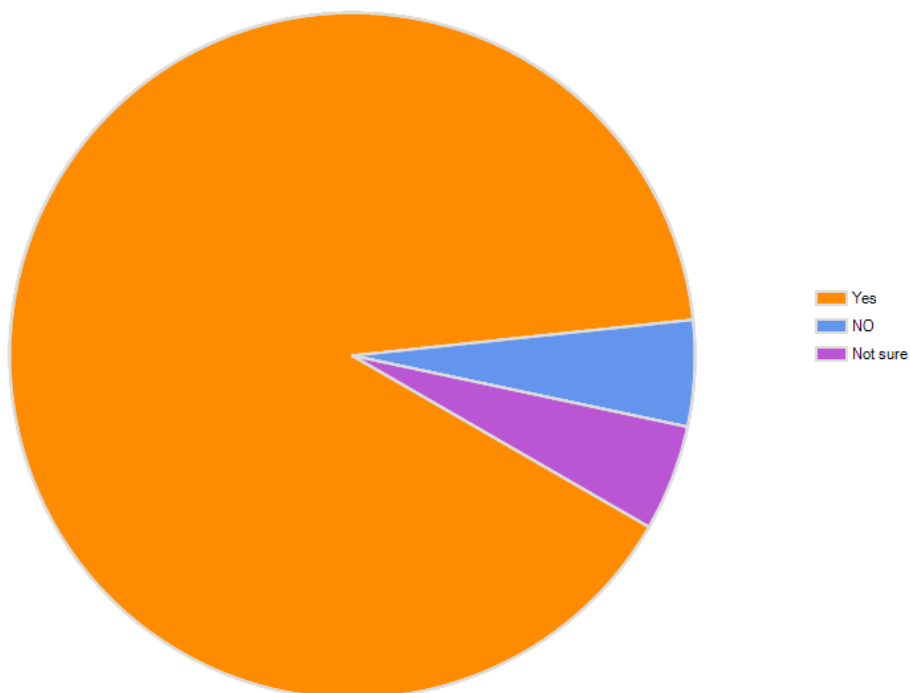


3. Did the date of the event suit you?

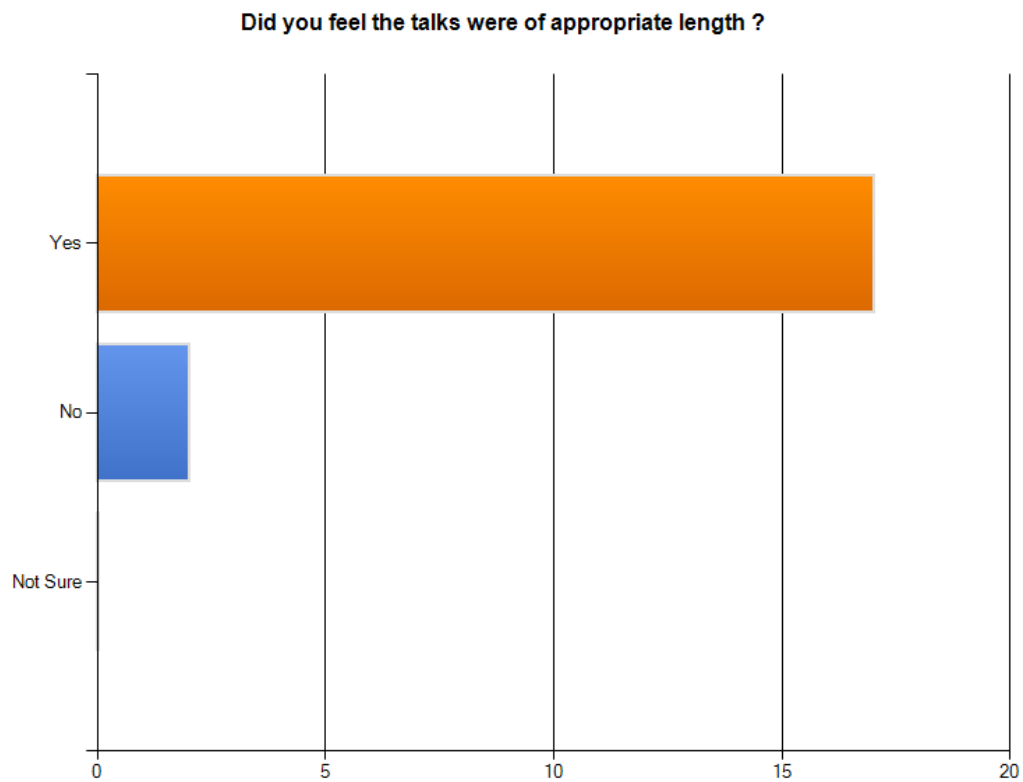
Did the date of the event suit you ?

In total 17 people responded to this question; 12 highlighted two talks while all 17 mentioned at least one. The talks most frequently mentioned by respondents were Martin Poulter's talk on the three prongs of outreach (4 four times), Robin Owain's review of Wikimedia in Wales (4), Martin Eve's talk on Opening up Humanities Sources (7).

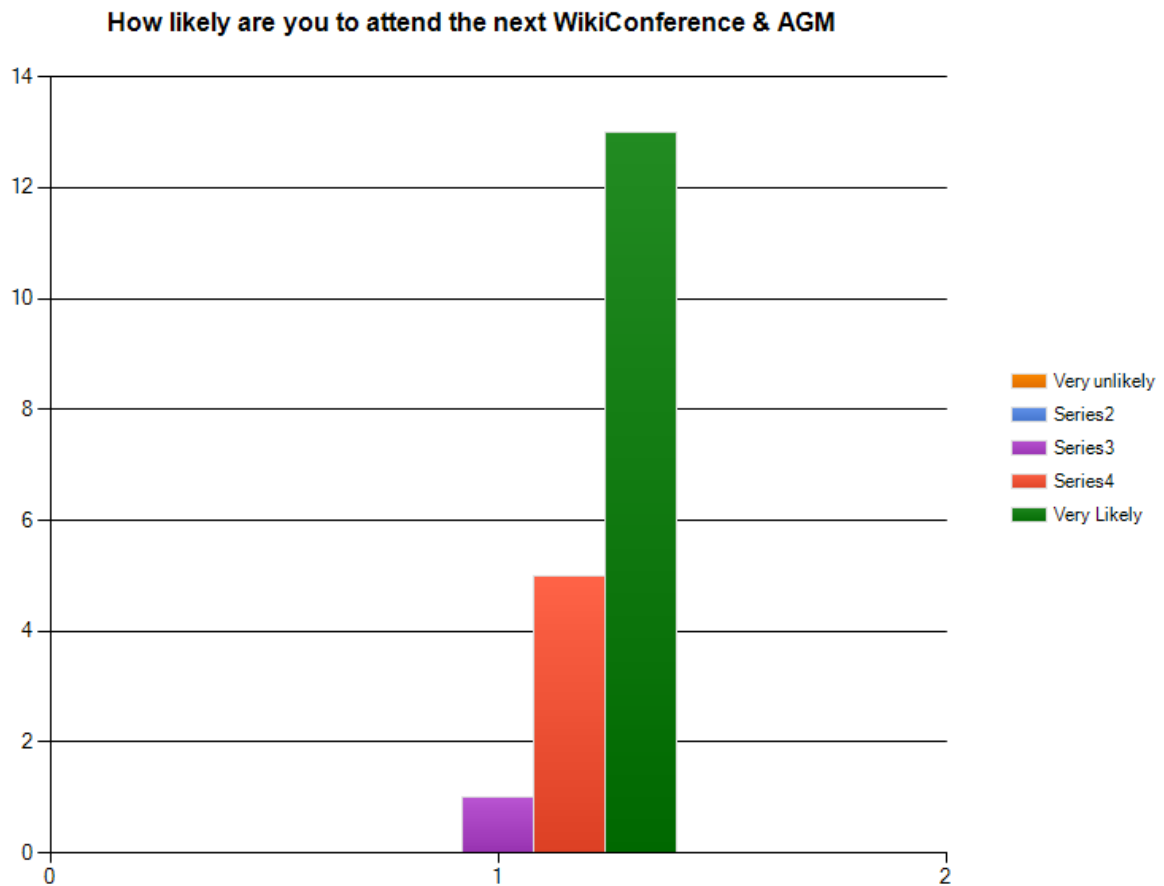
7. What were the two talks or sessions you found least useful or interesting and why?

Compared to the previous question this received far fewer responses: 8 compared to 17, with only one person highlighting two talks. Half of the responses highlighted the Malta Music Memory Project as the least useful talk, explaining that it was "a bit confusing" and "too obscure".

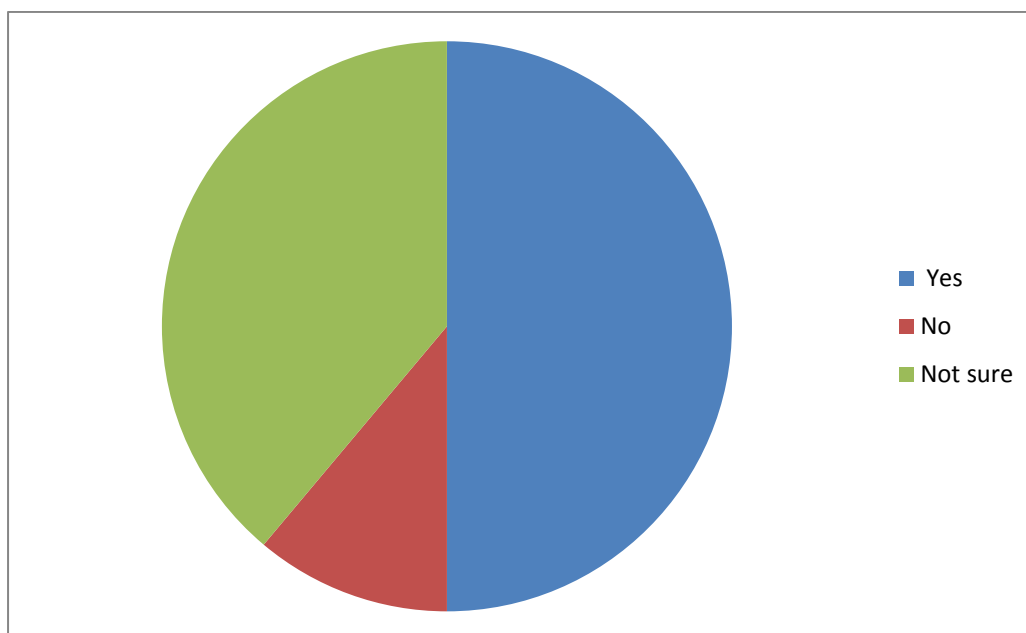
10. What would encourage you to attend next year?

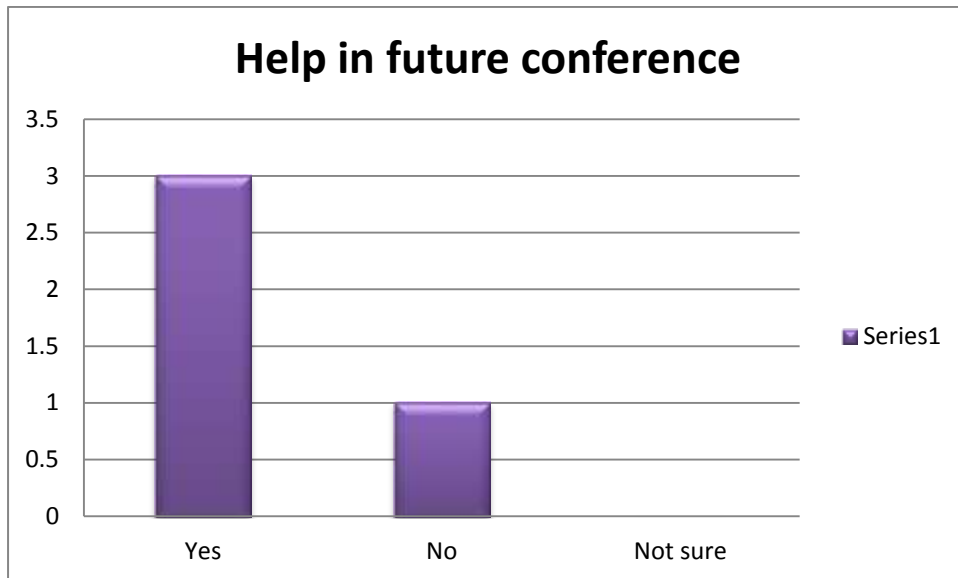
13. Are there any elements you think should be added to future agendas?
